403. THE FOREIGN RELATIONS OF THE UNITED STATES Two Semesters, 3 hrs.

A historical survey of the foreign relations of the United States with special reference to the princ ple of "non intervention", Anglo-American relations, the Monroe Doctrine and the Far Eastern policy. United States as a World Power; the League of Nations and some of the American problems growing out of the World War.

404. AMERICAN POLITICAL PARTIES One Semester, 3 hrs.

A study of the place occupied by parties in our political system, their history to the present, contribution to American political philosophy, with emphasis upon the internal organization of present-day parties.

405. A HISTORY OF THE PRESIDENCY One Semester, 3 hrs.

This course examines the electoral system in general, and then considers each presidential election from the first to the present, noting the changes that have taken place and the questions involved.

407. CONTEMPORARY GOVERNMENTAL PROBLEMS One Semester, 3 hrs.

The domestic and international aspect of present day governmental problems in Europe and America. An investigation of the factors underlying current social and political issues.

408. Roman Law

One Semester, 2 hrs.

History and influence on common law.

PUBLIC SPEAKING

The following program of courses in Public Speaking is prescribed for all students as part of their cultural training. It extends throughout the four years with sessions once a week.

- 101. Social Conventions
- 201. The Technique of Public Speaking
- 301. Typical Occasions.
- 401. PARLIAMENTARY LAW.

Besides taking the regular courses in Public Speaking, students who intend a legal career are expected to become members of the debating societies, and compete for the Ellen Kiely Memorial Debating Medal, gift of Fred M. Kiely, in memory of his mother.

RELIGION

Religion is taught twice a week throughout the four years of college. Attendance at these courses is obligatory for all Catholic students. The courses are so designed that the fields of apologetics, dogma and morality are covered within the scope of four years, thus giving the student a rather full and scientific survey of Catholic life and doctrine.

101. CATHOLIC TEACHING AND PRACTICE

Two Semesters, 2 hrs.

This course is concerned with the principal doctrines of Catholic teaching and the important practices of Catholic life, thus constituting an introduction to the subsequent courses in Religion. Class discussions and individual conferences afford students the opportunity of clarifying religious problems.
